



SWING AND A HIT

hile the words "affordable" and "accessible" can never really be associated with Dan D'Agostino, with many of its wares falling into 'price on request' territory, the US company can just about get away with describing its latest integrated amplifier, the Pendulum, as "entry-level", despite the fact that it still costs a cool \$29,995.

Representing D'Agostino's effort to reach a broader audience of audio enthusiasts while maintaining the performance standards associated with the revered brand, the Pendulum introduces a re-engineered version of the JFET input circuit topology originally developed for the company's \$85k Momentum C2 preamplifier.

Delivering 120W per channel into 8 ohms (and doubling to 240W into 4 ohms), the Pendulum derives its power from a custom 750VA toroidal transformer and 25,000 μ F capacitor bank — substantial specs for a unit of its relatively compact dimensions.

This robust power supply

implementation also incorporates sophisticated filtering to eliminate RF noise from AC powerlines, and addresses issues like asymmetric power waveforms — details that will certainly appeal to serious audiophiles concerned with clean power supply.

On the connectivity front, the standard configuration provides four analogue inputs — one single-ended RCA and three balanced XLR (including a theatre passthrough for home cinema integration), plus balanced preamplifier outputs for subwoofer integration.

And if you want a little extra, you can pay a little (relatively speaking) extra

by adding a phono stage with 60dB of gain for moving-coil cartridges (\$1,795), and/or a comprehensive digital module offering optical, HDMI, Ethernet and wi-fi connectivity (\$3,495).

The latter not only natively supports PCM signals up to 32-bit/384kHz and DSD signals up to DSD256 (11.2MHz) but also opens the gateway to streaming services including Tidal, Qobuz and Spotify, while offering MQA decoding for compatible files. It is due to receive Roon Ready certification shortly, too.

Aesthetically, the Pendulum maintains D'Agostino's distinctive design language, featuring a central LCD display
