CD PLAYERS

Primare CD31

IT'S ALL SUBJECTIVE, but to our eyes the CD31 is the best-looking machine in this test. There are more important things to be concerned with, naturally, but Oscar Wilde didn't say, "It's only shallow people who don't judge by appearances," for nothing. We're all interior designers now, it seems, and good-looks add to the overall charm.

We've judged a fair bit of Primare equipment lately, and found it all to be competitive, value-for-money stuff. The identically priced I30 amplifier scored five stars in August. And if one thing has become apparent from these

Primare's surefooted progress continues – fine sound and good looks should ensure plentiful sales recent tests, it's that Primare is pretty consistent in its audio signature – and the CD31 sits just as comfortably in sonic terms with its siblings as it does visually.

Demonstratively talented...

Loading I Am Kloot's splendid *Gods* And Monsters disc into the CD31 hints at its credentials early on. It's a painless, drama-free exercise (unlike the Cyrus or Copland machines) which illustrates the Primare's superb build. Neither does the sound disappoint. It's not the most immediately impressive listen, but the CD31 is a subtle and insightful device that founds a big, well-defined sound-stage and unearths fine levels of detail.

There's possibly less raw shove to dynamically testing material than is ideal, but the Primare communicates in spades without ever getting right up in your face like the Copland does.

Switch to the CD31's balanced outputs and it's an even more impressive story: sound separates yet further, making the stage easy to understand, and the previously rather reticent character gains plenty more crunch and bite. Sheena Is A Punk Rocker by The Ramones sounds genuinely insolent, packed with attitude and ropey musicianship.

With the balanced output, things step on decisively in the dynamic area: there's greater attention to detail, better grip on

transients and lovely, broad-stroke definition. Voices benefit too, becoming ever-more natural and expressive. At the bottom of the frequency range, there's ample weight and admirable speed; the upper frequencies attack glossily.

So what Primare has served up is a well-made, competitively priced, impeccably finished and handsome CD player that sounds a treat and won't be overly fussy about its partnering equipment. At this price, there's more to a CD player than the sound it makes, and Primare seems to have hit the bulls-eye in every area of the manufacturing process. Can you tell we're mightily impressed?

MULTIDISC: Some players can store more than one disc. High-end players are usually single-disc units. PHONO stereo are the most common type of interconnects used to connect a CD player to an amplifier. Also called 'RCA', these are an analogue connection.

BALANCED outputs: These outputs allow for a superior type of analogue connection - one that's more resistant to outside electrical interference. AES/EBU DIGITAL: Also sometimes (wrongly) called a 'balanced digital' connect-

ion, this type of digital

terminated with the same sockets as balanced leads. OPTICAL DIGITAL - High quality connection that sends a digital signal as a beam of light. COAXIAL DIGITAL: The best type of digital connection sends a digital signal as an

connector uses coaxial cable

electrical signal. Used the same kind of terminations as a standard RCA/phono lead. HDCD: High-definition compatible CD is a type of CD that has more data than a standard silver disc encoded on it, for better sound. CD TEXT: Some discs are encoded with information

relating to the artist, CD and song title that can be decoded by a suitable player to appear on the display. DISPLAY OFF: Some players allow you turn the display off, which tends to subtly improve the sound as it reduces interference to sound-reproduction circuits.

WHEN THE CHEAPEST CD player in a test costs £1400, it might seem inappropriate to talk about 'bargains' - but that's what the Primare CD31 is. It's rare that a test

(especially one as competitive as this) is won by a player other than the best sounding, but the Primare is breathing down the neck of the Copland on that

score, and trounces it in other significant respects. As an all-round package, this Primare CD player impresses us hugely.

Hedonists take note

The Copland snatches defeat from the jaws of victory here - it's so unpleasant to use that we couldn't just concentrate on the sound. In fact, if the Densen had just a little more focus at the low end, it could have forced the best-sounding device into the bronze-medal position. As it is, the Densen is a diverting option that'll will appeal to hedonists especially.

And the rest...

The second tier are all capable devices: the Cyrus and Naim kit might have dropped down to four stars but they're still packed with talent, despite their relative shortcomings being exposed by the newcomers. The Myryad and Exposure players, though very different temperaments, are also worthwhile machines that any sensible person should audition. Happily, there's not a poor CD player here - these are four very capable devices that live up to their price tags, though they're demonstrably not quite the 'bargain' that the CD31 undoubtedly is. Congratulations to Primare all round.
